# My dear Parishioners of St. Joseph and Malia Puka O Kalani

We are already midway through Lent. This third Sunday of Lent brings us Jesus at the well encountering the Samaritan woman. Jesus was physically thirsty. He needed water to quench his bodily need for water. The Samaritan woman who came to draw water had her thirst too. But unlike Jesus she did not recognize the type of thirst that she had. She had in fact a spiritual thirst that could be quenched only by drinking the ever-living water of righteousness and faith. What Jesus tells her is that one drink from the right source would quench her thirst forever. We too have our thirst and often we do not recognize what can really quench our spiritual thirst. We, just like the Samaritan woman, seek to satisfy our spiritual thirst in unholy and often worldly sources. We are looking for solutions in the wrong places. The woman was of questionable repute and probably spent a lot of her time looking for love in all the wrong places. She had been married multiple times, and now not married, was probably looking for something a bit unholy at the well. Clearly her life was not in accordance with the teachings of the Scriptures. Jesus knew about the situation of the woman but did not refrain from talking with her and giving counsel to her so that she could seek to satisfy her spiritual thirst by approaching the source of living water that only Jesus could give. There are times when we are helpless; when we are incapable of taking care of some of our personal needs. We have to identify the types of thirst we have. What are we doing about our thirst for love? What about our thirst to find a meaning to our lives? What about the thirst for the knowledge that my life is making a difference in the world? These are the thirsts that the water of faith – the water of Baptism- can quench.

We have an opportunity as a Catholic community to identify our spiritual thirst for God and drink from the everlasting source of life itself. Make it a point to attend the parish spiritual retreat and make use of the chance to get closer to Jesus.

# **Sunday Reflection**

### Third Sunday of Lent Year A

Readings: Exodus 17:3-7; Romans 5:1-2,5-8; John 4:5-42

### First Reading: Exodus 17:3-7

This passage is a story of Israel's continuing struggle with trust and faith in God, who leads them during their wandering in the wilderness. Moses comes into conflict with the Israelites because they have no water. The Israelites want to return to Egypt where water was plentiful. Following God's instructions, Moses makes water flow by striking a rock. The point of the story is that faithful living is obedience to God, not finding plentiful resources.

### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9

Psalm 95 is a call to praise God in joyful fidelity, aware that we must be tested before God. We are not the ones who test God. That is why the concluding verses and the response look back to the unfortunate incident in the desert of Israel's past as an example of how not to respond to God. Response: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

### Second Reading: Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

Perhaps in all of Paul's letters there is no other passage which carries such a powerful message than this one in Romans 5. Faith in Christ has established our new relationship with God. We now receive many additional blessings - endurance in suffering, hope of standing the test of our faith and reconciliation with God. These come to us because of God's love which has been poured into our hearts through the gift of the Holy Spirit. All of this has been brought about through the death and resurrection of Jesus who died for us while we were still sinners.

### Gospel: John 4:5-42

The Gospel is the account of Jesus' conversation with a Samaritan woman. This is perhaps the most unusual event of all those reported in the New Testament. John used this event to reinforce the theme of his gospel: Faith in Jesus as the source of living in relationship with God now and in the life beyond death. Here again as in Exodus 17 and Psalm 95, water has a symbolic meaning. It represents the life of the Spirit which comes through faith. In this instance it may also symbolize the water of baptism which initiates our faith relationship with God. The passage is also a gradual self-revelation event of Jesus to the Samaritan woman who gradually becomes aware of who Jesus is. She becomes aware of her own identity as well as her need for the living water, Jesus Christ, the source of eternal life.

# Part 6a—The Liturgy of the Eucharist

As we celebrate the Eucharist each Sunday we are faithful to Christ's command "do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19;1 Corinthians 11:24). Never in the history of the world has such a liturgical command been obeyed by so many people, under so many diverse circumstances, and in so many ways.

This directive has been followed by popes in Rome and by missionaries in remote areas of the world, by peoples in hamlets, towns, and cities, by powerful monarchs and by unlettered peasants, in prison camps and in majestic cathedrals, by our long forgotten ancestors, by our grandparents, our parents, and by us. Sunday after Sunday, week after week, year after year down through almost twenty centuries. This action of "doing," of celebrating the Eucharist, has been the most cherished action of the Church since its very beginnings.

### Eucharist continued from page 3



In this first reflection on the Liturgy of the Eucharist we will consider the general structure of the Eucharist and then mention several major themes which high-light the meaning of its celebration.

#### THE TRADITION OF THE EUCHARIST

Jesus' words, which we hear at every Mass, were "do this in remembrance of me." But just what is it that we "do" as we carry out this command. These words of the Lord were said at the Last Supper, which most scholars believe was a Jewish Passover meal. And at this meal celebrated by Christ several actions stand out as especially significant according to the scriptural accounts of the event. The New Testament writers tell us that toward the beginning of the meal Jesus

- 1. took bread;
- 2. said a prayer of blessing (i.e., praise) over the bread;
- 3. broke the bread:
- 4. and distributed the bread.

Then toward the end of the meal Jesus

- 5. took a cup of wine;
- 6. said a prayer of blessing (i.e., praise) over the cup
- 7. and shared the contents of the cup

The early Christian community, conscious of Christ's example and command, continued these actions of Jesus and did so within a meal setting. And yet there is no reason to believe that the first Christians followed all the ritual details of the Passover meal.

At a very early period a number of factors influenced the shape of the Eucharistic celebration. As the numbers of Christians increased, it became more and more difficult to serve a regular meal every week. There is also evidence that certain divisive abuses at times occurred in conjunction with the common meal (cfr. 1 Corinthians 11:18).

Furthermore, as Christianity began to spread into a Gentile milieu, there was a danger that the Eucharist could be confused with meals associated with certain pagan religious and political movements. As a consequence, two major changes took place, perhaps taking place somewhat simultaneously.

First, the Eucharist was gradually separated from the meal: the bread and cup rites to which Christ had given a new meaning in reference to himself were at first celebrated either before or after the meal, and eventually completely apart from the meal.

Second, since there was an evident parallelism existing between the bread rite and the cup rite, a process of ritual simplification took place. The seven actions of Jesus became four actions. Bread and wine were "taken" and placed on the table together; one prayer of praise to God was offered over the bread and wine together; the bread was then broken; and finally the Eucharistic bread and wine were distributed at the same time. This four-action shape of the Eucharist has been preserved to this day.

- 1. PREPARATION OF THE GIFTS—taking of bread and wine.
- 2. EUCHARISTIC PRAYER—praise of God over the bread and wine.
- 3. COMMUNION RITE


Preparation—the breaking of the bread.

Distribution—the giving and receiving of the consecrated bread and wine.

At Sunday Mass we are faithful to Christ's command when we make ready the altar and gifts for what is to come, when we praise the Father in the Eucharistic prayer, when we break bread as a preparation for sharing at the table of the Lord. Throughout the centuries many embellishments (i.e. auxiliary prayers, actions, and gestures) were added within this basic framework. And yet these additions, many of which were reordered or modified as a result of the Second Vatican Council, must never cause us to lose sight of what is basic when we gather in obedience to Christ's command. 
