



April 6 Third Sunday of Easter Year A

Readings: Acts 2:14, 22-33; 1 Peter 1:17-21; Luke 24: 13-35

First Reading: Acts 2:14, 22-33

This passage is one of Peter's addresses given on the day of Pentecost. It is a preface to the central events of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Peter gives witness on four main points: 1) that Jesus was sent by God and gave evidence through the miracles he performed; 2) that Jesus was delivered up to die on the cross by God's foreknowledge and plan; 3) that all of Israel was responsible in handing over Jesus to be killed; and 4) that God raised him up, because "it was impossible for him to be held" by death. All these events about Jesus happened to fulfill the messianic hopes of God's people given to David.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 16:1-2, 5, 7-8, 9-10, 11

In the first reading of today, Peter quotes Psalm 16 to prove that King David had prophesied Christ's resurrection. Christ fulfills that prophesy because David spoke not about himself, but about the promised Messiah. The quote is fittingly placed in the mouth of Christ as well as his followers. Response: "Lord, you will show us the path of life."

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:17-21

This text may have been an exhortation to newly baptized adults. As Christians, we are not holy by our own effort or merit, but solely on account of Christ, in whom we have been reborn through baptism. The passage refers to the Passover ritual of the Jews, in which the blood of the lamb was the price of their deliverance from slavery in Egypt (sin) to the land of promise (new life in Christ).

Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

Luke's account of the appearance of the Risen Lord to the disciples on the road to Emmaus is one of the most moving and favorite resurrection stories. It traces the disciples' despair at the death of Jesus to the joy of knowing that he is alive and still with them as he had promised. The text reveals a lack of understanding of what Jesus had told the disciples about his rising from the dead. Luke also used the idea that their dark minds (something) prevented the two disciples from recognizing the Risen Lord until the Lord interpreted the Scriptures for them. But Luke also develops a context and a climax for the recognition of the Risen Lord in the breaking of bread.



Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis

Article 22:

They Recognized Him In the Breaking of the Bread

When the disciples who met Jesus on the road to Emmaus invited him to join them for dinner, Luke's gospel tells us, they "recognized him in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:35). A bit later the book of Acts describes the life of the early Church this way: "They devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers" (Acts 2:42).

So "the breaking of the bread" was a phrase that early Christians used to describe the Mass. This ritual gesture was seen as central to the meaning of what they did when they gathered on Sunday.

The term can remind us of two significant points. We use the term "breaking bread" with friends or family as a way of speaking about sharing a meal together. Using this phrase to describe the Eucharist reminds us that the central ritual of our faith is a meal that we share with Christ. We spoke several weeks ago of the Mass as a sacrifice. It is also a meal. We might call it a sacrificial meal or a sacrifice in the form of a meal. Jesus chose a meal as the fundamental symbol of the Eucharist, and he reveals his presence in the breaking of the bread.

The breaking of the bread is a practical prerequisite for sharing a meal. In an age of pre-sliced loaves, we may need to remember that, in ancient times, bread was not sliced but commonly broken and shared. So the breaking of the bread speaks first of sharing, and thus it speaks of the union that we call Communion. Our liturgical prayers often speak of our sharing one bread and one cup as a symbol of our unity in the one Christ. We break the bread in order to share the one loaf.

This practical action, however, has also taken on a symbolic meaning. Christ's body was broken for us and his blood was poured out for us. So breaking

the bread also reminds us of Christ's sacrifice. In the process, it reminds us of our commitment to share in his sacrifice. If we love as he did, we have to be willing to allow ourselves to be broken and our energy poured out. We have to be willing to allow ourselves to be consumed by others. We have to be willing to be the body of Christ, and that means we have to be willing to nourish those around

We do not do this exactly as Christ does, of course. We are broken and poured out and consumed figuratively, but the commitment is the same as that of Jesus. It is our willingness to love as deeply and as widely as he does that is crucial.

This deeper meaning of the ritual action is emphasized by the song that accompanies it. The "Lamb of God" speaks of Jesus as the lamb of sacrifice, who takes away the sins of the world and grants us peace.

The breaking of the bread is another element of the Communion Rite that helps us to prepare ourselves to enter into intimate union with Christ and with all our brothers and sisters.

A Measure of Quality

What speaks volumes about the quality of a St. Joseph School education is that Barrett was not the only valedictorian in 2007 who was the beneficiary of a St. Joseph School education. Two of Barrett's 6th grade classmates in 2001 were the valedictorians at their respective schools: Sara Dale at Waiakea High School and Lauren Carvalho at Kamehameha Schools-Hawai`i Campus.

This school year Barrett is a student at the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA), Sara is at Thomas Aquinas College, while Lauren is at Harvard University. All are to be commended for their outstanding achievements. We wish them continued success.

Spotlight on Academic Excellence

Besides the spiritual values and moral training one would expect to find in a Catholic school, St. Joseph School provides a quality academic experience at every grade level. Accredited by the Western Association of Schools & Colleges, the Western Catholic Education Association and the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools, St. Joseph affords students many opportunities to excel academically in grade, whether through the elementary school reading program or honors and advanced placement classes at the junior -senior high school. More than 97% of our graduates are accepted to universities and colleges and some of them—like Hannah Katibah, class of 2008—become National Merit Scholarship finalists.


To help faculty and students meet state and diocesan educational standards, SJS is implementing curriculum mapping in both the elementary and high schools. Curriculum mapping outlines the content and skills for each subject at each grade level for the year. There are multiple advantages to this system: 1) Course content introduces knowledge and skills necessary for later coursework, e.g., related math skills for physics; 2) Skills can be reinforced across various subject areas through the school year; 3) Course content and student assessments are available to other teachers within the school as students advance and can be made available should students transfer to another school or out of state.

Although St. Joseph emphasizes excellence in the class-room, our students also shine in the larger academic arena.

- The SJS Mock Trial teams finished first and third in the Big Island competition and Team A competed at the State level.
- Christian Borris will participate in the State National Geographic Bee after having won the SJS competition and becoming eligible to move on through a written exam.
- Sara Tollestrup, Catelyn Hakoda, and Alyxandra Hopkins were selected to advance to the Hawaii State Science and Engineering Fair in Honolulu. After their excellent performances in the SJS and Hawaii District competitions.






