

# 16th SUNDAY IN TIME

Humanity has a great hunger for the truth hardwired into our souls. God made our hearts for eternity, and the whole of salvation history is directed to that end. From revealing himself and making covenants, to sending Jesus and establishing the Church in the present day, God never ceases to give himself to his people. He never ceases to provide for, care for, and lead his people. The Lord is indeed our shepherd, and there is nothing we shall want. The Lord is a good shepherd.

In today's readings, we have insight into how the Lord helps us carry out our responsibilities. The Apostles in the Gospel reading are so overwhelmed by the crowd's longing for Jesus that they did not have time to eat. Human strength is not enough! All ministry needs grace. We have a duty to the truth, but may face confrontation and conflict as a result. So Jesus steps in and calls for some refreshment: come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while. The love of the Father, the reconciling peace of the Son, and the igniting fire of the Holy Spirit should be the strength of us all. 
# **Mahalo!**

# HEART ATTACK

A Heart Attack is a "Plumbing Problem"

Blood vessels that supply the heart become clogged, depriving the heart of oxygen. The tissue begins to die, potentially causing permanent damage if not treated.



A person experiencing a heart attack may experience crushing chest pain, shortness of breath, numbness and tingling in the left arm, even a "sense of impending doom." However, the victim may remain conscious and talking throughout the attack. In fact, some people will endure these symptoms for days before seeking treatment.


Don't ignore the signs and symptoms of a potential heart attack. The best course of action is to seek immediate

medical care. The sooner the attack is treated the better the outcome will be.

# CARDIAC ARREST

# A Cardiac Arrest is an "Electrical Problem"

The electrical impulses that allow the heart to maintain a productive rhythm become disrupted and may stop altogether. This means that the rest of the body will begin to starve for oxygen within minutes.



A person experiencing a cardiac arrest is unconscious, has no discernable pulse and isn't

A cardiac arrest is not a result of old age or heart disease: it can be the result of an injury, such as an electrical shock, or a previously undetected

defect, and can effect anyone at any age. Chest compressions and the use of an Automatic Electronic Defibrillator (AED) could help to keep the victim

alive until help
