"...to seek and save what was lost."

Most of the time, it would seem that man has been seeking God but God is no where to be found. Just like Zacchaeus in the Gospel today. He was seeking to see who Jesus was. He wanted to see Jesus so intensely that: "He ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see Him" (Luke 19:4).

And imagine Zacchaeus surprise when Our Lord Jesus looked up to where he was and called him by name: "Zacchaeus, come down quickly. for today I must stay at your house." A sinful and lost person that he is - is recognized by Jesus. By such prophetic action, Our Lord extended to this sinner an offer of forgiveness, mercy, and acceptance by God. So in the end, it is not Zacchaeus who found Jesus, but instead it is Jesus who found Zacchaeus!

As disciples of our Lord, we have one thing in common with Zacchaeus: like him, we are all sinners and therefore are in need of God's mercy. So like Zacchaeus let us begin "seeking to see who Jesus was." And like Zacchaeus, trust that we will also be given the opportunity for repentance in an atmosphere of acceptance. For after all, Jesus' mission is "to save what was lost."

What would you do if you know Jesus would come and stay in your home today? And we know, everyday, Our Lord comes knocking at the door of our hearts. Are we ready to let him in?

From empowering immigrants in towns along the southern border to advocating for improved housing and educational opportunities in northern and midwestern cities, CCHD-funded groups tackle a wide range of economic and social justice challenges that affect local communities in rural and urban areas.

In areas of Tennessee where coal-mining operations and landfills have caused water pollution and other environmental damage, Statewide Organizing for Community eMpowerment (SOCM) works with governments and regulatory agencies to limit hazardous waste disposal in landfills and to require environmental cleanup as part of the permitting process for new business operations.

Environmental damage affects all of us, most especially low-income people who are affected by water pollution resulting from mineral extraction, lack of access to healthy foods in urban "food deserts," and natural disasters caused by climate change. The Church teaches that "the natural environment is a collective good, the patrimony of all humanity and the responsibility of everyone" (Pope Francis, Laudato Si, no. 95). Since the release of Laudato Si in 2015, CCHD has invested more than \$4.3 million in organizations that work to protect the environment and combat pollution.
